# Recap: MacGlObAS 2021 Fall Seminar

MacGlObAS hosted its fall seminar in late November **"Recharging Global Surgical Partnerships post-**COVID" chaired by Dr. Jean Chamberlain, welcoming speakers from Canada, Guyana, and Uganda. Dr. Laurie Elit (top right image), Gynecologic Oncologist and Professor Emeritus from Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology at McMaster started the event defining Global Surgery and challenges addressing the global surgical burden. Dr. Elit shared her recent experience working in Cameroon, the impacts of COVID-19, and

strategies for improving surgical capacity. This was followed by a presentation by **Dr. Pius Okong** (bottom right image), Director of Health Services and Obstetrician Gynecologist from Uganda. Dr. Okong spoke about his experience of global surgical partnerships in Uganda and lessons learned in adapting partnerships in the COVID-19 context. **Dr. Alexandra Harvey** 

(bottom left image), Anesthesiologist and Director of Medical Education at the Institute of Health Sci-



ence Education in Guyana, concluded the presentations reminding participants that most countries are not "post-covid" but instead this is a new normal we face. She described that COVID-19 has presented many new challenges for training medical professionals, however the experience also saw new innovations to improve surgical education. She challenged global partners to continue to support global surgical education development and learn from the experience of the pandemic. #### Correspondence from the Field: Dr. Laurie Elit

"The service we render others is the rent we pay for our room on earth" Sir Wilfred Grenfell Back in 2018, I had made a plan to leave my Hamilton Gynecologic Oncologist practice in Sep2020. My goal was to spend the last 5 years of my career providing gynecologic oncology care in underserviced areas as a way of giving back to society for all the incredible blessing I had received in my lifetime. When I was in medical school (a very long time ago), I had received a Physician Services Incorporated award to work for a summer in High Level Alberta. Here I shadowed a group of family doctors as they met the health care needs of the Mennonite community, several Indian reserves and an oil rig community. I learned that lessons of global health begin with experiences gleaned in our own Canadian setting.

More recently, while serving in Mbingo Cameroon, I was asked if I could also help in Newfoundland. Due to a sabbatical, the team was on an extended time of 1 in 2 call which was becoming untenable. So, I spent my summer as a gynecologic oncologist in St. John's NFLD. However, I repeatedly heard about lack of access to healthcare across the province. Most Newfoundlanders who reside outside of a major city have no expectation of access to a nurse practitioner much less a family doctor. Thus they have no access to tests or pharmaceuticals. For any form of health care, they need to travel hours from their isolated coastal residence to a city hospital emergency room. Due to geography, telehealth is a standard of care here and it long predates its popularity during COVID. As a result of lack of access to health care and poor nutrition, preventative issues like hypertension and diabetes are not well managed. Obesity rates are really high and access to bariatric medical or surgical management are limited. Cost of living in St. John's, NFLD is much higher than southern Ontario (ie., \$1.60/l gas, fruit and vegetables rot quickly, price specials in the grocery store seem to focus on potato chips and pop). What I saw in the clinic was part of a bigger reality. The Nova Scotia provincial elections took place this summer and a cornerstone issue involved the need for doctors, nurses and other primary care supporters. Actually in 2020, Newfoundland elected Dr. A. Furey, an orthopedic surgeon as their premier. It is not clear how the health care system will evolve in Atlantic Canada/NFLD & Labrador, suffice to say that health care personnel are desperately needed.

While in Newfoundland, I had the opportunity to take a 1000km road trip to St. Anthony's. This city is at the northern tip of the province. Back in 1892, Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, an English trained physician travelled to Newfoundland and Labrador under the



Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fisherman to improve the plight of coastal dwellers. St. Anthony's was his home. During his career he opened a number of hospitals, schools, orphanges, industrial work projects and co-operatives. It wasn't until 1970 that the health care system was turned over to the provincial health authorities. *Left image of Dr. Laurie Elit standing beside of statue of Sir Wilfred Grenfell.* 

If you are considering any form of Global Health Care service, consider service for a time in your own country of Canada – not where all the amenities are present, but rather where the air is clear, the grass and trees are so very green (at least in the summer) and the wind never stops blowing. "Real joy comes not from ease or riches or from the praise of men, but from doing something worthwhile" Sir Wilfred Grenfell.
